Resiliency in Ministry: For ministry personnel. This will be an interactive workshop providing time for reflection, conversation, connection, and even some fun. We'll look at research, tools, and practices for healthy and effective ministry.

Reconciliation in Action: Reserve 107: Screening of the half hour movie *Reserve 107* followed by an intro to Reconciliation Saskatoon and conversation about the joys and struggles of reconciliation work in your context.

Medical Assistance in Dying: Gifts and dilemmas for our faith communities. For almost a year, medical assistance in dying has been legal throughout Canada. Come reflect together on the spiritual impact of this policy on our communities, families, and faith. Bring an open heart and mind.

I was in prison in SK and you visited me: Almost exactly five years ago, Saskatoon hosted a national hearing of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission. Today, SK has the highest rate of Indigenous incarceration in the country. What's the link between residential schools and prison? What is, and could be, a church response and church responsibility? What work is already happening, and where do we find hope? (Hosted at McClure United).

That We May Know Each Other: visit to the Saskatoon Islamic Centre and mosque. Bring your questions and an open heart as we visit with our Muslim neighbours and their sacred space.
